HLC Students Honoring the Elderly

On February 27 our middle and upper primary students, along with our secondary students, went to visit the elderly residents of St. Joseph's Nursing Home in Khon Kaen. This outreach activity was led by our Thai teacher, whose aim was to teach our students to appreciate the beauty of Thai culture. One important value in Thai culture is showing honor and respect to the elderly.

Our group did some warm-up activities, leading the seniors in some slow and gentle physical exercises. Then the students and teachers spent some time listening to and talking with the residents. This was a heartwarming experience, because our students were very attentive to what the grandpas and grandmas were telling them. They told them their sad stories, their life lessons, and shared how they are having fun with their friends at the nursing home. After chatting with them, the students sang encouraging songs. While the students were singing, the elderly quietly listened with smiles on their faces. After the singing we handed them little cards that our lower primary students had prepared days before the outreach. Then we gave them some dry goods and other essentials before heading back to the school.









For most of our students, it was the first time they had visited a home for the aged, and it really touched their hearts. During our evaluation one of our children said that she felt sad, and at the same time happy. She felt sad for some of the elderly who were left in the nursing home by their loved ones. She felt bad that some of them were abandoned by their family members. On the other hand, she felt happy that she was able to bring them some joy and encouragement, even if it was only for a short period of time.

It was a brief 2-hour visit, but the life lessons we learned will be remembered for years. It was a wonderful opportunity for our students to experience one of the beautiful values of Thai culture, that of honoring their elderly people. What made it more special is that the children showed honor and love to the older people who needed it the most.





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
